



What's happening with the Curriculum?

You may have heard that the New Zealand school curriculum is changing. This is a big national update, the first major one in nearly 20 years, and it's all about making learning clearer, more consistent, and easier for children to build on as they move through school.

The refreshed curriculum is called Te Mātaiaho. In simple terms, it's designed to help children learn important knowledge in a well-planned, step-by-step way, rather than jumping around or missing key pieces along the way.

What's different?

In the past, the curriculum used very broad "levels" that covered several years of schooling at once. That meant it wasn't always clear exactly what a child should know by the end of each year.

The new curriculum changes this by setting out clear, year-by-year learning goals. This helps teachers, students and families understand:

- what children are learning now
- what comes next
- and how everything fits together

You might hear this described as a "knowledge-rich" curriculum. That simply means students will be taught the important facts, ideas and concepts in each subject, and these are carefully chosen and sequenced so learning really sticks, rather than being rushed or left to chance.

The new curriculum is also built on what's called the science of learning — research about how children best remember, understand and use what they learn. This means lessons are designed so new ideas connect to what students already know, and key learning is revisited and strengthened over time.

Is everything changing all at once?

No ... and that's a good thing.

The new curriculum is being rolled out gradually over the next few years. Different learning areas will be updated in stages, giving schools time to learn, plan and introduce the changes in a careful and thoughtful way.

In 2026, the Maths and English areas will be officially introduced.

How learning will be organised

Under Te Mātaiaho we continue to have key learning areas:

- English
- Mathematics
- Science and understanding the natural world
- Social studies and Aotearoa New Zealand's stories
- The arts
- Technology and digital learning
- Health and physical education

Within each learning area, learning is organised into:

- **Knowledge strands:** the important ideas and information children need to learn
- **Teaching sequences:** the order these ideas should be taught so they make sense and build properly over time
- **Knowledge:** the facts, concepts, principles, and theories
- **Practice:** skills, strategies, and applications
- **Capabilities:** skills like reasoning, communicating, relating to others, self-management, self-regulation, problem solving, and creativity

Together, this means children will be building real understanding, step by step, in a way that grows with them from year to year.

What does this mean for our children?

For students, this means:

- clearer learning goals
- smoother progress from one year to the next
- and fewer gaps or repeats in what they are taught

For families, it means it will be easier to understand what your child is learning and how they are progressing.

We'll keep sharing updates as the new curriculum is introduced, and we're excited about what this will mean for learning in our school.

Important Reminders

Absences
